Bisley target bookings

Target booking at Bisley has become very expensive. The cost for a single target with NRA marker is about £110. Because of the timing and nature of our competitions, we are restricted to a maximum of 6 per lane for the Silhouette shoot and 7/8 for the Buffalo. As the Club grows, we shall be in a position to book extra targets as we need them. However, for now, it is vital that everyone pre-books the competitions. If you don't, there's no guarantee that you will shoot.

Spring Silhouette Shoot



The very first Spring Silhouette Shoot couldn't have gone better. The weather was great and allowed all shooters to quickly get on target at 300 yards for the pig and chicken. To facilitate sighting-in, we shot at the pig first. This presented a bigger sight picture which enabled those without sight settings for this distance to get on target quicker. Geoff Hoden brought along his own spotter, Mike, who had enough optical capability to see the moons of Jupiter. That's what's it's all about Geoff ... team work!

At 500 yards it was easy to get the elevation sorted out quickly. However, because of an unpredictable and gusty cross wind from the left, only Clive Taylor managed to nail 6/10 rams with his big .45-120 (3¹/₄"). I knew it would come in handy for something, Clive. He also managed to 'straight' all 10 pigs and while he was on a roll, scored 6 out of 10 chickens to win the coveted High Chicken award. Now there's a prize worth winning.
